STILL LIVES is a series of site-specific performances and art installations, in which the artists 'capture' a cultural symbol that means a lot to people and a place. This work has been presented in Naarm/Melbourne, Fremantle, Singapore, Venice and Florence.

For Still Lives: Ghent, Luke and Daniel will tie up and suspend two Belgian cyclists in the style of rope bondage.

WHAT'S INVOLVED?

We're looking for cyclist [past or present] who would be interested in participating in the work.

More details and required time commitment is laid out in detail on the next page.

The goal of this 2-hour performance is to have the cyclists and their bicycles suspended in the air as if they are in the middle of a race. For example: tilting to one side as they round the tight curve of the velodrome track or crossing the finishline of a Flanders Classics.

The exhibition will also include a short film of each cyclist in the performance, giving the audience a chance to get to know you better. Your video will include an interview about your history with cycling and your relationship to the sport, people and culture.

- Luke and Daniel will work with 8 performers who will act as stand-ins, to allow for preparation for precise ties options and positioning practice.

ABOUT STILL LIVES & THE ARTISTS

Since 2014, Luke George and Daniel Kok have studied the use of ropes, rigging and knotting, to develop unique performances and exhibitions. Their works have been performed and toured around Australia and the world, including STILL LIVES commissions for the 2019 Venice Biennale, the Fremantle Biennale 2023 and the Rising Festival Melbourne 2022 (co-commissioned by RISING and the National Gallery of Victoria)

Luke George (he/they) is a multidisciplinary artist, born in lutruwita (Tasmania) and residing on Wurundjeri Country in Naarm (Melbourne). Through their work, Luke examines the dynamics of intimacy and collectivity to create 'safe spaces' that allow for care as well as risk. Luke's artistic practice is informed by queer politics and spaces, whereby people are neither singular nor isolated; bodies of difference can intersect, practice mutual listening, take responsibility for themselves and one another.

Luke creates and performs work across Australia, Asia, Europe and North America, with notable presentations at the Venice Biennale, Dance Massive (Melbourne), RISING, National Galleries of Victoria and Singapore, Rencontres chorégraphiques de Seine-Saint-Denis (Paris), Time Based Art Festival (Portland) and many more. Luke was a 2019 Australia Council for the Arts Fellowship recipient.

Daniel Kok has a BA in Fine Art & Critical Theory (Goldsmiths College, London, 2001), an MA in Solo/Dance/Authorship (HZT, Berlin, 2012) and has studied Advanced Performance and Scenography Studies (APASS, Brussels, 2014). His performances have been presented across Asia, Europe, Australia and North America, notably in the Venice Biennale, Maxim Gorki Theater (Berlin), AsiaTOPA (Melbourne) and Festival/Tokyo. As artistic director of Dance Nucleus (Singapore), he focuses on building capacities for interdisciplinary praxis and trans-local partnerships in Asia and Australia. He curates the annual da:ns Lab at the Esplanade (Singapore) and is a core group member of the Asia Network for Dance (AND+).
